

Risk to World Heritage Sites across the Mediterranean from rising sea levels

The Mediterranean coastline is rich in cultural legacies from various ancient civilizations, including the Phoenicians, Greeks, Egyptians, Romans, Byzantines, and more. These historical treasures have endured through the ages, but are now facing a pressing threat from climate change. Rising sea levels are endangering cultural heritage sites situated in vulnerable coastal regions.

Tourism, closely tied to cultural and natural heritage, plays a vital role in the economies of many Mediterranean communities, making the need for climate adaptation even more critical. Throughout the region, 49 UNESCO World Heritage Sites are located in coastal areas at risk, including famous destinations like Alexandria in Egypt, Carthage in Tunisia, Venice in Italy, and the island of Delos in Greece.
